I'm Done Homeschooling – Things I Would Do Differently and Things I Would Do Again by Marilyn Boyer

Introduction: I just want to share with you what I LOVE about homeschooling and what I was bawling about as I wrote about what I knew I would miss about it.

TEN THINGS I'D DO DIFFERENTLY

1. Don't feel like I have to teach everything that is in the book or finish every book.

2. Don't assume that a government school course of study is best for my child.

3. Don't hold my child to standards of "where they're supposed to be" or hold them back because they are learning too quickly.

4. Realize there is no average child.

5. Don't feel pressure to prove to others that my kids are "where they're supposed to be" or being "properly socialized."

6. Refrain from feeling inadequate to teach my child. Instead, develop dependence on God to creatively supply what each child needs.

7. Don't assume my kids need lots of involvement with kids their own age, but instead expose them to all ages of people.

8. Don't be afraid to discern that certain subject material is detrimental to my child's spirit and refrain from using it even if everyone else thinks I have to teach it.

9. Use textbooks, but not exclusively. Get my child into the real world. Use books as tools, but not be enslaved to them. Practical implementation is a very good teacher.

10. Waste large quantities of my child's time with skills they will never need.

TEN THINGS I'D DO ALL OVER AGAIN, AND MORE OF

1. Study my child to learn their passions, desires, what inspires them, what discourages them, and teach accordingly. Plan what I see my child as needing to study, not some prescribed program.

2. Listen to and ask for their input on how they learn best or which curriculum to choose.

3. Let them explore their interests and passions.

4. Cut down on busy work, realizing that it motivates a child to see an end to the lesson and more time to explore areas of interest.

5. Find ways to serve others, teaching by example how to develop a servant's heart.

6. Be creative with "subjects" taught.

7. Encourage my child to try new things. Some they won't like, sometimes they'll find new passions.

8. Focus on character building and instilling God's Word in their hearts.

9. Making time for fun things. Looking for ways to teach so they don't even realize they are learning.

10. Stay home more often than not. It's hard to effectively homeschool when you are never home.
